The National Indian Nations Conference brings together a wide range of providers, stakeholders, and victims of crime to share their knowledge and develop programs to serve the unique needs of American Indians and Alaska Natives. The 17th National Indian Nations: Justice for Victims of Crime Conference is tentatively scheduled for March 22–25, 2022, on the Agua Caliente Band of Cahuilla Indians Reservation in California. This conference will focus on American Indian and Alaska Native crime victims and provide

2021 FAMILY VIOLENCE PREVENTION & SERVICES ACT (FVPSA) GOVERNMENT-TO-GOVERNMENT CONSULTATION

The Family and Youth Services Bureau, Family Violence Prevention and Services Program is inviting all Tribal Leaders to attend the virtual Government-to-Government Consultation, a two-day virtual meeting to build meaningful relationships with federally recognized Tribes receiving FVPSA funding by engaging in open, continuous, and meaningful consultation. The FVPSA Program is inviting Tribal leaders to provide verbal and written testimony on the allocation of FVPSA grant awards for Tribes. The FVPSA Program will also invite Tribal leaders to give verbal and written testimony on establishing a minimum grant award of \$55,000 for each Tribe that applies for FVPSA funding.

APPLY FOR THE THE TRIBAL ACCESS PROGRAM (TAP)

Submit your application for TAP. The U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) launched TAP in August 2015 to provide Tribes access to national crime information systems for federally authorized criminal and non-criminal purposes. TAP allows federally-recognized Tribes to more effectively serve and protect their nation's citizens by ensuring the exchange of critical data across the

Readers learn how Power and Control ploys like intimidation, isolation, emotional abuse, economic abuse, or using children might look in a relationship. Each DV Tactic brochure also has a corresponding Equality brochure, which illustrates the opposite behavior in a healthy relationship, including respect, trust and support, and honesty and accountability. PROGRAM MANAGEMENT AND LEADERSHIP WORKSHOP

This course will provide targeted training for managers of OVC Tribal Victim Services grant projects. The first and third weeks of the course will include 4-hour, live online, lecture-based sessions. The second and fourth weeks will provide self-review resources, live discussion board interaction, and a live, 1-hour "ask the expert" session.

CHILD ABUSE: FROM SUSPICION TO DISCLOSURE

CHILD SEX TRAFFICKING: FROM SUSPICION TO DISCLOSURE

This webinar, hosted by NCJTC, will teach strategies to enhance the likelihood of obtaining information from possible victims of child sex trafficking. Facilitators will compare and contrast typical child sexual abuse cases with child sex trafficking (CST) cases and address the different points of entry into the criminal justice and welfare system for CST victims. The webinar will also review various disciplines' roles and how they can



contribute to a positive outcome of a CST case. Furthermore, participants will examine question strategy, interview dynamics, language use, and interview suggestions, and discuss the business model of child sex trafficking as it relates to a variety of crimes.
